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General Course Information

To develop leaders who preserve and protect the people, property, and efficacy resources of an organization in a healthcare setting.

<u>Course Description</u>: This course will familiarize graduate students with the unique safety management challenges present within the healthcare industry. The successful student will be able to identify issues surrounding provider and patient safety in healthcare and regulatory agencies involved in the healthcare industry; as well as facility specific safety concerns (i.e. hospital, ambulatory care centers, pre-hospital emergency medical care, etc.).

<u>Methods of Instruction</u>: This course will meet weekly and will consist of lecture-based instruction, group-based discussion, scenario based learning, and other activities during the regularly scheduled class meeting time. Students are expected to prepare for each class in advance, which includes, but is not limited to, completing assigned readings.

<u>Course Goal</u>: The goal of this course is to provide the student with a comprehensive study and analysis of duties and responsibilities of occupational safety and health professionals in the healthcare industry.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify agencies that have regulatory oversight of the healthcare environment.
- 2. Identify voluntary healthcare accreditation organizations and the role they play in the healthcare industry.
- 3. Explain the impact that violence against healthcare workers can have on safety programs
- 4. List safety concerns that are unique to the healthcare industry.

<u>Participation</u>: Attendance and punctuality is necessary to succeed in this class. All students will be expected to participate fully in class discussions. Participation in class will be reflected in the student's final grade. If a student misses a class, the student is still responsible for all missed material.

<u>Article Assignments (4 total)</u>: Students will find an article that presents a safety issue that is unique to healthcare. Sources could include peer-reviewed journals, news sites, trade journals, etc. Students will summarize the issue identified in the article, regulatory bodies that have oversight of the identified issue (if any), and either the mitigation strategy used to solve the problem or your suggested mitigation strategy. Each summary should be no more than two typed pages, Times New Roman, 12 Font, 1" margins, and in APA with references. These summaries will be presented by the student in class to facilitate discussion.

<u>Violence Against Healthcare Workers Paper:</u> Students will find information on a recent act of violence towards a healthcare worker. The paper will be a summary of the incident, and outcome if provided. The summary should be no more than two typed pages, Times New Roman, 12 Font, 1" margins, and in APA format with references.

<u>Individual Project</u>: Students will be given a scenario of a mock survey with 10 found deficiencies. Students will need to state what standard(s) the deficiencies violate. Student will also state actions will be needed to remedy the issue and also which department(s) within the hospital need to be involved with the known deficiencies. A paper will be written in Word document (Times New Roman 12 Font, 1" margins, APA References).

<u>Group Project</u>: Students will need to access https://qcor.cms.gov/hosp_cop/State_Level.html and find a hospital with a recent survey completed and that had a known immediate jeopardy situation. The group will need to print out he survey and highlight at least 5 deficiencies to discuss. A paper will be written (Word document, Times New Roman 12 Font, 1" margins, APA References) of the deficiencies and which standard(s) each violate. The group will also be responsible to prioritize the violations.

<u>Midterm Exam</u>: The midterm exam will be administered during the regularly scheduled class time. The exam may include a combination of multiple choice, definitions, short answer questions, and essay questions.

<u>Final Exam</u>: The final exam will be cumulative and summative. Students are responsible for any material included in this syllabus, in the assigned readings or handouts, or discussed in class. The exam may include a combination of multiple choice, definitions, short answer questions, and essay questions.

Syllabus Statements

<u>Attendance Policy:</u> Attendance during the regularly scheduled class session is not required but will be reflected in the student's final grade.
